Objectives: • To acquaint teachers with various contemporary writers for children and YA – most of them award-winning authors - whose work students will find both extremely appealing and easy reading.

• To propose authentic material, rather than graded readers, for an age group which is often difficult to please.

• To provide teachers with innovative teaching strategies that will allow them to make the most of the novels in preparation for future IGCSE ones.

• To provide Language/Literature teachers and librarians with background information about authors and texts being used and read nowadays (both in in schools and for pleasure) in English –speaking countries.

Contents: Extracts selected from recently published books will be included in the handout to appreciate the stylistic elements as well as the potential use in the class.

NO PREVIOUS READING OF MATERIAL IS REQUIRED The participants will be provided with the material (extracts from texts) the day of the course. Due to the length of the texts used the reading and analysis will be done during the course.
